R. Yaakov David Willowsky (1845-1913)

Most European rabbis who came to America a century ago spent the remainder of their lives here. But some individuals had difficulty in adjusting and returned to Europe. One outstanding talmud chacham who came to the United States but eventually returned to Europe was Rabbi Yaakov David Willowsky. From all accounts, Yaakov Willowsky was a child genius, who never attended any yeshiva but received his Torah knowledge from his father, private tutors and self-directed study. Born in 1845 in Kobrin, Belorus, Willowsky received his first rabbinical position at the age of 23, and published the first of many works, a Talmud commentary titled *Migdal David*.

The publication of *Migdal David* enhanced his reputation as a formidable sage, and in 1881, Willowsky was appointed dayyan in the beit din of the great city Vilna, where he authored his first work of responsa, *Teshuvot ha-Ridvaz*. It was now evident to many that Willowsky was not only a great Talmudist, but a reputable posek. Most rabbis do not merit to be known by an acronym or by the title of one of their works. R. Yaakov Willowsky came to be known by colleagues and friends as the Ridvaz, taken from the title of his responsa.

With the approach of the *shemittah* year 5649 (1888-1889), Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Spektor of Kovno, relying on the view that *shemittah today* is of rabbinic origin, sanctioned the nominal sale of the land to a non-Jew, and the employment of non-Jewish laborers during the *shemittah year*. This position met with opposition on the part of a number of rabbis, notably R. Yehoshua Leib Diskin and R. Shmuel Salant, both of Jerusalem. A staunch defender of R. Elchanan Spektor was Rabbi Avraham Isaac Kook (1865-1935), who wrote an entire work on this subject. He, too, was not without his opponents, of whom the most prominent was R. Yaakov David Willowsky, who wrote a treatise, *Kuntres ha-Shemittah* in opposition to Rav Kook.

In 1890, Willowsky was appointed Rav Av Beit din in Slutzk, Lithuania. He succeeded in having the kehillah leaders financially support a new yeshiva. Soliciting the help of the famed R. Nosson Zvi Finkel, mashgiach ruchani, (aka) the Alter of Slobodka, Willowsky welcomed fourteen Slobodka students to Slutzk, which formally opened in 1897. Willowsky then brought the esteemed R. Isser Zalman Meltzer to assume the helm of the yeshiva. The Slutzk yeshiva emerged as a great center of Talmud scholarship.

Willowsky had a lifelong interest in the study of Talmud Yerushalmi, the mastery of which was not common among European yeshiva students. After working for more than seventeen years on a commentary to the Yeshushalmi, Willowsky was eager to print a new edition incorporating his comments. He arranged with a printer to assume 60 per cent of the cost of publication, with Willowsky responsible for the 40 per cent balance of the publication cost. To this end, R. Willowsky came to America in 1900 to gain sponsors and patrons for the projected work. Not surprisingly, numerous congregations solicited his services and encouraged him to remain permanently in the United States. But Willowsky was intent on collecting money and returned to Europe. Upon his return, he dedicated the Nezikin order of his Talmud Yerushalimi edition to American patrons.

In 1903, Willowsky returned to America to continue financing the publication of the Yerushalmi commentary. This time he agreed to become rabbi of a consortium of Chicago synagogues. Willowsky's presence in Chicago meant that America now hosted one of the great Talmud scholars in the world. But Willowsky's appointment was marred with considerable controversy, as several local rabbis, ritual slaughterers and butchers resented his interference in their authority and livelihood. Attempting to ensure proper standards of kashruth, R. Willowsky potentially undermined the vested interests of others in the kashruth industry. His work, *Nimukei Ridvaz*, contains an important introduction pertaining to the history of kashruth supervision in Chicago, in which the author castigated the overseeing rabbis, as well as the overall state of Jewish practice and education in America. R. Zvi Shimon Album, one of the rabbis who was targeted by Willowsky's allegations issued his own polemical work in response, called *Divrei Emeth*, which sought to argue that the Ridvaz was himself guilty of the self-same charges of Kashruth

supervision improprieties. Willowsky soon realized that he would not be successful in the American rabbinate, and in 1905, he departed for Safed. In Safed, he established a yeshiva, Torat Eretz Israel, and supported the development of the new and growing Zionist yishuv in Israel. Willowsky left an important legacy of published works including teshuvot, Talmud insights, and a sweeping new edition and commentary on the Talmud Yerushalmi. He died in Safed, on the first night of Rosh Hashanah, 1913.
